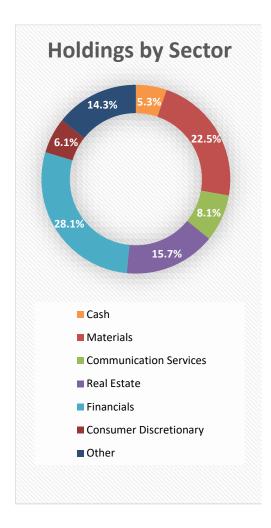

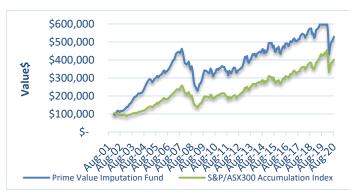
Market review

Global markets were strong in August, with all major indices rising, as positive announcements around vaccine trials, outweighed concerns around increasing COVID 19 infections in many countries. Particularly eye catching was the surge in technology stocks across many markets, including Australia.

Global commodity prices continued their recovery in August. Brent Oil prices rose US\$1.98/bbl to US\$45.28/bbl, partly driven by the improving global economic outlook and a depreciating US Dollar. Iron ore prices rose a further US\$15.00/t to US\$125.00/t on rising demand in China and reduced supply from low cost producers. Gold prices decreased slightly from a record high US\$,1964.90/oz to US\$1,957.35/oz due to the improving global growth outlook. The Australian Dollar rose 3% against the US Dollar in August and is now up 10% over the last year. The strength in the currency will be a headwind to companies with significant revenues in US dollars.

The ASX300 Accumulation Index rose 3.0% in local currency terms, underperforming the Developed Market's World Index return of 6.3%. The August gain was the fifth consecutive month of positive performance for the Australian share market which has rebounded 35% from its COVID 19 sell-off lows in March. During the month, IT (+15.5%), Consumer Discretionary (+8.7%) and REITs (+7.9%) outperformed the most, while Utilities (-4.8%), Communication Services (-3.8%) and Consumer Staples (-0.4%) underperformed.

The highlight of the month was the company reporting season. Against mostly pessimistic expectations, company results were better than expected with great resilience in revenues and/or margins for COVID 19 exposed stocks in Consumer Staples, Building Materials, Discretionary Retail, Gaming, General Industrial and Insurance. From our observations, many companies reported reasonable activity levels as economies progressively re-opened. Also heartening to observe was companies adapting to the dynamic environment by reducing costs, strengthening their balance sheet and some seeking to exploit new opportunities for future growth.



This graph shows how \$100,000 invested at the Fund's inception has increased to \$529,200 (net of fees excluding performance fees). This compares very favourably with the return of the market, where a \$100,000 investment would have increased to \$401,600 over the same period. The returns exclude the benefits of imputation credits.

Fund review & strategy

We have gone through another reporting season. Zoom, Webex, Team were the new normal for result briefing, catching up with management, 1-1 meetings etc. To state the obvious; almost anything IT were the Covid winners – new machines, services, software, e-commerce; plus the umpteen delivery trucks in the streets. Some of these might change our way of life or the way of doing business going forward. In term of our dividend expectations, big miners such as BHP and RIO continued to remain conservative, both not electing to pay special dividends despite their strong financial position. Fortescue (FMG) with a payout ratio of 77% generated a 5% fully franked dividend yield for the Half as iron ore price stayed higher than the long-term average. We had a surprise from ANZ which decided to pay a small dividend (deferred from May reporting). The outlook for the banking sector remained highly uncertain and it is unlikely to be a source of dividend in the near future.

The Fund returned 3.3% for the month, slightly ahead of its benchmark. Key contributors were **Nine Entertainment** (NEC +22.5%, good cost outs and strong digital media performance), **Goodman group** (GMG +8.1%) and **Monash IVF** (MVF +20.9%, essential service well positioned). Detractors were **Telstra** (TLS -13.7%, as market questioned the sustainability of its dividend on reduced earnings expectation), **Newcrest** (NCM -9.1%, volatile gold prices) and **CBA** (-4.1%, price dropped after performing strongly into reporting)

The market is now trading on 19X PE ratio and dividend yield of 3.3%. Industrials is trading on 26X with some tech names trading at high revenue multiple. The very stringent Victoria re-open pathway means the negative economic impact will remain significant. High growth new economy companies are gaining momentum and are ascribed high valuation as they are fast becoming reality, accelerated by Covid.
